From the Pastor's Desk



This morning, I opened a national newspaper to notice a well-known politician firing the first shot upon the “War on Christmas” as he lamented the use of the term “holiday tree.” The politician prefers the term “Christmas tree,” referring to the National Tree that stands on the White House lawn. The lawmaker also experienced prolonged rage afterwards as the national holiday tree will be decorated with a science theme.

And so it begins. The “War on Christmas.”

As people of the Christian faith, we know it’s time to prepare our hearts for the birth of Jesus Christ during the season known as Advent. Advent is an intentional time to remember an unmarried refugee teenage girl traveling as a foreigner to another land to give birth to our Messiah among sparse surroundings.

Advent is a reminder of heavenly power given to earthly people like us. This is the true battle of the season—reclaiming the real message of Christ.

Some of us already received our first jolly advertising flyers filling our mailboxes accompanied by holiday emails promoting drastic discounts. There is more stuff and consumption than Mary, Joseph and Jesus could have ever imagined celebrating our Savior’s birthday.

Christ didn’t want more stuff. Quite the opposite. He didn’t ask us to make a commercial celebrating his birth (although Mr. Pillow proudly wears his shiny necklace cross alongside sparkling tinsel pedaling holiday bedding). Jesus didn’t even ask us to have a birthday celebration for him. He did ask us to “love one another” and care for the marginalized and the poor. The “War on Christmas” has everything to do with capitalistic values that exploit Advent and Christmas. The “War on Christmas” is not about semantics or terminology. It’s about where our hearts and treasures lay under the tree.

Christ advocated for the poor, the refugees, the immigrants, the oppressed, the outcasts, and those of us needing the Good News of salvation.

Pastor Karis has led Adult Education sessions in November with discussions supported by two books: *Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination* and *I Can Do No Other: The Churches Here I Stand Luther Moment*.

In December, we will continue our series entitled *Jesus and His Jewish Influences*. The 30-minute video sessions will be presented by Professor for Teaching Excellence in Judaism, Dr. Jodi Magness, at The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Jesus' teachings were the product of a fascinating dialogue with the traditions, cultures, and history of ancient Jewish beliefs.

The schedule for December is as follows:

- Dec 8—Alexander the Great's Impact on the Jews (J. Feldman)
- Dec 15—Jews and Greek Rule: The Heliodorus Affair (J. Feldman)

ELCA Signs on to Golden Rule 2020 Initiative

Christian leaders from a wide range of denominations, and theological and political views, signed on to engage in activities that support Golden Rule 2020: A Call for Dignity and Respect in Politics. ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton signed the statement of support.

The initiative was prompted by a convening of faith leaders earlier this year by the National Institute for Civil Discourse. The Statement of Support notes that “Churches have an important role to play in helping to heal America, and we hope and pray that local congregations will be active in efforts to increase understanding and bridge divisions in our country between now and the 2020 election.”

Congregations and individuals are encouraged to promote the use of the Golden Rule in their political discussions and election activities in 2020.

ELCA Bishop and Conference of Bishops Support Funds for East Jerusalem Hospitals

The presiding bishop and conference of Bishops of ELCA have issued a letter to President Trump urging the administration to restore funding to Augusta Victoria Hospital (AVH) and other hospitals in East Jerusalem. AVH is owned and operated by the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) and supported by the ELCA and several other member churches of the LWF.

In the letter to President Trump, the bishops urge the administration to consider the impact financial cuts to AVH is having on cancer patients and others treated at its facilities. These cuts have forced AVH to delay treatments and to turn away patients. While LWF and its member churches will continue to provide lifesaving treatments to patients from the West Bank and Gaza through AVH, “the accumulated debt of the Palestinian Authority make it increasingly difficult for AVH to pay staff, pay pharmaceutical suppliers for medications and avoid interruption of patient treatments.”

The letter was signed by the Reverend Elizabeth Eaton, presiding bishop of ELCA, and the Reverend William Gafkjen, chair of the ELCA Conference of Bishops, and notes that as of July 31, 2019, the PA debt to AVH was nearly \$40 million, an unsustainable level for the LWF.

ELCA, Church of Sweden, The Episcopal Church Recommit to Address Climate Issues

The ELCA, Church of Sweden, and The Episcopal Church recommit to work together to advocate for "national and international policies that address the urgency of the climate crisis and help create resilient communities while leaving no one behind." This recommitment is a renewal and update of the commitment made by the three church bodies in 2013.

The statement issued jointly affirms that they have not fully dedicated themselves to the work necessary to affect change, but with God's guidance, "can do better in meeting this critical issue of our time." Specifically, they commit to:

- Advocate for national and international policies and regulations that enable transitions to carbon neutral resilient societies in ways attentive to the many dimensions of climate justice.
- Pursue education and advocacy efforts that attend to the most vulnerable, whose needs must be put ahead of the more privileged.
- Will raise awareness in our churches by promoting the use of education, worship and action resources available locally, regionally, nationally and globally.
- Will seek deeper understanding, through praying and listening to experiences in our own communities and with others, about ways overconsumption can be addressed and about the diverse impacts of climate change.
- Will build multiple collaboration: through support and cooperation with our international communions, through inter-religious dialogue and shared advocacy, through national and international organizations and with all others seeking to address climate change.

Celebrating Family

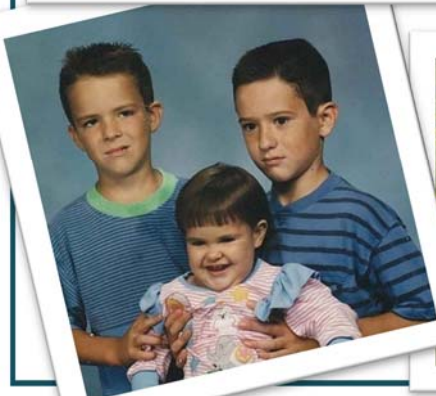

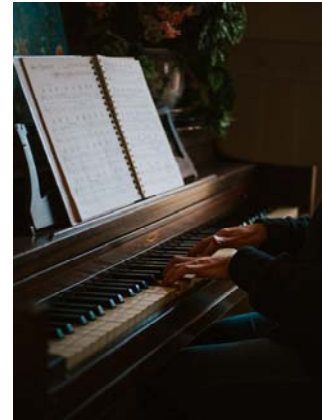
