

Hope Clinton joins local community clean-up day

Have you ever wondered why the majority of Jesus’ ministry was in the community and not in the temple of his day? Time and time again, Jesus was consistently serving others and healing people out and among them. The gospel accounts are filled with Jesus’ interactions out among the people. At Hope Clinton we are actively involved in our local community in Clinton, Maryland and throughout the US with our nation-wide members. Last Saturday, Hope Clinton participated in the North Clinton Community Association neighborhood clean-up.



What if that person you've been trying to avoid is your best shot at grace today? And what if that's the point?

In *Accidental Saints*, New York Times best-selling author Rev. Nadia Bolz-Weber, and ELCA pastor, invites readers into a surprising encounter with what she calls “a religious but not-so-spiritual life.” Tattooed, angry and profane, this former standup comic turned pastor stubbornly, sometimes hilariously, resists the God she feels called to serve. But God keeps showing up in the least likely of people—a church-loving agnostic, a drag queen, a felonious Bishop and a gun-toting member of the NRA. As she lives and worships alongside these “accidental saints,” Nadia is swept into first-hand encounters with grace—a gift that feels to her less like being wrapped in a warm blanket and more like being hit with a blunt instrument. But by this grace, people are transformed in ways they couldn’t have been on their own.

In a time when many have rightly become dis-illusioned with Christianity, *Accidental Saints* demonstrates what happens when ordinary people share bread and wine, struggle with scripture together, and tell each other the truth about their real lives. This unforgettable account of their faltering steps toward wholeness will ring true for believer and skeptic alike.

PASTOR CARPENTER TO LEAD *JOY UNSPEAKABLE* DISCUSSION



Pastor Tony guides the North Clinton neighborhood through Barbara Holmes book, *Joy Unspeakable*. This book challenges a narrow, Eurocentric definition of Christian contemplation by examining the full range of contemplative practices of the Black church. Contemplation isn't merely stillness or silence; it is whatever roots us inward - toward spirit, toward wisdom, toward an anchor in the best of the traditions of ancestors, toward a unity of heart and mind, toward an integration of intellect and emotion and action. She writes, "Our obsession with blamed with the question of who is or is not worthy of God's full embrace disrupts the journey. For we are not headed toward a single goal: we are on a pilgrimage toward the center of our hearts.... We need only make the contemplative turn to restore our inner sight." Holmes looks not just to the songs and prayers and culture and Biblical interpretation of the Black church, narrowly defined, but to the spirituality of social protest movements, the wisdom of Black leaders operating outside the sphere of church, the syncretism of the Christian tradition meeting African spirituality, the expressions of wisdom and heart-centeredness of Black music.

Members of the ELCA believe that Christ's church is not ours to control, nor is it our job to sort, divide, categorize or exclude. Our faith liberates us to embrace each person in their wholeness — questions, complexities, ethnicity, culture and all. The Ethnic Specific and Multicultural Ministries team assists the ELCA in becoming more culturally diverse and anti-racist by working with ELCA congregations, synods, communities, agencies and institutions. The team provides consultation, programming and resources to help accomplish this work to which the ELCA is called.

The Ethnic Specific and Multicultural Ministries team works within the ELCA toward the goal of full partnership and participation of African Descent, American Indian and Alaska Native, Arab and Middle Eastern, Asian and Pacific Islander and Latino people in the life of this church. This is done in partnership, together with leaders throughout the church, churchwide ministries staff, regions, synods, congregations, agencies and institutions. Each ethnic specific community has developed a mission strategy unique to their needs and aspirations. Each ethnic specific ministry program director works in partnership with their community's rostered and lay leaders and ethnic associations.

The Ethnic Specific and Multicultural Ministries team also assists this church in working to become more culturally diverse and anti-racist by providing resources and opportunities to engage in cross-cultural and racial equity learning through the work of Racial Justice Ministries.
